

It's Not Just About Getting Sober

When David, a 20-year alcoholic, was laid off from his job, he went home and drank himself into a stupor.

"I remember I was lying in bed, and I said, 'Look, God, you and I got to figure this out. I'm not going to do this anymore. I'm tired of the way life is, and I need something different.' I was always a believer, but God and I hadn't spoken in years."

That night, God answered David's prayer. He woke up the next morning and the desire to drink was gone. But the pain that he'd been running from with every drink was still there.

Homeless and Hungry

Unable to get another job, David lived in his truck until it was repossessed and then started couch surfing.

"I sold off everything I had left to be able to eat," he remembers.

But it wasn't just food David needed. It was a new life. His sister, Kenzie, who is the shelter manager at The Rose, our women and children's...

shelter, saw it, too. She encouraged David to come to the Mission.

"I had been homeless for almost two years at that point," he says.

David came to the Mission and applied for the New Life Program. Even though he wasn't drinking at the time, we knew God had more for him, and as he went through the program, David began to realize it, too.

"It took me a long time to discover the underlying issue was that I never felt loved. And so I never had any self-worth, so I never cared. And I held that against God."

But at the Mission, surrounded by people who cared about him and wanted the best for him, David began to see that God loved him, too. That changed everything! David completed the program and graduated in 2022 and has been living a new life ever since.

Living in New Life

"I got a job right before I graduated," he says. "I've had three promotions and four raises. I had a friend at church for a long time that became my girlfriend and is now my fiancée." David and Laura are getting married this month! He's also been able to reconnect with his daughter, who he hadn't seen for three years.

A Call to Community

"My life before the Mission was miserable, lonely, empty. My life after the Mission is full of faith. It's full of love and it's full of community. God's calling a lot more people into His community, and I think that the stuff that we do here pushes that purpose forward," David says.

This Easter, we can push that community forward by celebrating the resurrection and sharing God's love with poor and needy neighbors. Will you help by providing meals?

What happens at the table, when people break bread together, is holy.

That's the only word I have for it.

And that's why I'm so grateful for the meals provided by friends like you. Not only do they give much-needed nourishment for our hurting neighbors, but meals are often the start of life-changing relationships, especially at Easter.

Celebrate Recovery



Not every part of our New Life Program happens on campus.

Celebrate Recovery, a community support group that is hosted at several local churches, is a big part of the process, and it's a key element for anyone in our program.

John and Phyllis, who have been Celebrate Recovery sponsors for about 10 years, helped walk David through the program.

And while "Recovery" is in the name, it's not all about addiction.

"I'd say it's Christian 12-step program," Phyllis says. "It's not just drugs or alcohol. It's for any past hurts, habits, or hang-ups that one might have. And usually, people don't grow to be past 30 without something like that in their life."

"One of the misconceptions about Celebrate Recovery is, 'It's for those kinds of people,' John says. "But it's not just for those kinds of people. It's for all of us. You might be hung up on your walk with Christ, and you don't know where the sticking point is . . . We all need it. We all need recovery."

And a big part of recovery (from anything) is relationships.

"We find that sobriety is not the opposite of addiction," John says. "Connection is the opposite of addiction. And when you're connected with others, when you're connected with yourself, when you're connected with Christ, you'll find that your need to self-medicate kind of takes a backseat."

"We provide services, but there's a deeper need," David says. "There's something underlying that people need."
