Because of Jesus, We Never Give Up

At graduation from the New Life Program in 2023, there was one moment that Grant will never forget.

"At the beginning, they ask anyone who has helped at the Mission in any way - volunteers, mentors, donors, staff - to stand," he explains. "You don't realize how many people were really in your corner until you see a whole room full of people standing."

Before coming to the Mission, Grant felt like he gave up on life, and looking back on it now, he is loving his life.

Grant's Addiction Started at 13

"I dropped out of high school. I didn't go to college. I used drugs in my addiction, life was not going the way I planned, and God was not my priority," he says. "I had no relationships with any of my family. I felt like they didn't want anything to do with me. I didn't want anything to do with them. So, the only thing I cared about was getting high and drinking."

Alone, homeless and addicted, Grant says his life became a dark hole. The Mission was his only refuge for almost eight years. The gifts from friends like you made it possible for us to never give up on Grant.

Eight Years of Meals

Because of the consistent meals, shelter and care Grant got here, when he was finally ready to change his life – eight years after that first meal – he knew where to come. He applied to our New Life Program and was accepted.

"I didn't really understand the whole God thing until I joined the program and started doing the classes and going to church. And that's kind of when I was like, wow, this is an awesome program. It's unlike any other program," he says. "I started to put God first and then everything else started to fall in line. I started to get back everything that I lost and more."

But that didn't mean there were no more challenges. In fact, Grant left the program a few months before he graduated. He stayed sober but realized for the best chance at making a new life, he had to finish, so he came back. This time he stuck with it and graduated.

A Whole New Life

"Graduation was my biggest accomplishment," Grant says. "It felt like a whole new start of a new life, a new life program."

Today, Grant is 4 years sober. He works full time as a driver for our Thrift Store, has restored

relationships with his family and now shares the good news of Jesus Christ with everyone he can, including people he used to be on the streets with.

"I'll see certain people and I'll say hi, and they'll say, 'Wow, what happened to you?' And I'll say, "I gave my life to the Lord, and he's helped me stay sober for four years now."



Program Spotlight: Jail Ministry

When Jesika goes to pray with incarcerated men and women, sometimes they scoff and say she has no idea what they are going through.

They're wrong.

Jesika's been homeless, she's battled addiction and she's been in jail, all of which make her uniquely suited in her role as the Mission's Jail Ministry Coordinator. She's been there and done that and knows the type of prayers and encouragement men and women incarcerated need the most.

"Being that I've been to jail myself, I know the importance of not feeling forgotten and getting words of encouragement and words of hope while you're there," she says.

But instead of keeping that knowledge and the pain of her experiences to herself, Jesika shares them with the team of volunteers, equipping them to minster in ways that will have lasting impact. If you're interested in joining the team, we can't wait to connect with you.

"We want to encourage others and share the good news that Jesus can set them free from anything and everything," Jesika says.

Doubling our capacity and footprint nearly overnight has been an amazing blessing – and quite a challenge.


But with God's faithfulness and the support of friends like you, we've been able to welcome the very first women and children into our new 60,000 square foot campus at 2447 Summerfield Road.


"It gives people a hope for a better future," Grant says. "One of the most powerful things you can do for someone who is hungry is give them food."
